Meeting Minutes

WELCOME AND HOUSEKEEPING

Ginger Ostro explained the public comment process and reviewed the Ground Rules and Guiding Principles established by the committee. Brian Durham calls for approval to accept the February meeting minutes. Joy Patterson made a motion to approve the minutes and Joni Scritchlow seconded. the motion. A unanimous yes vote from those present followed. Durham reviewed the remaining portion of the agenda.

WORKFORCE PRESENTATION

Carisa Hurley-Davis introduces members from Danville School District. Dr. Alicia Geddis, Chris Rice, and Kelly Truex share how consortium efforts have been impactful in a school setting. Highlights included Danville SD 118 grow your own program, partnerships established with the local community college, grant funds to support their various programs (MIECHV/Prevention Initiative), Preschool for All, and Pre-School for All Expansion Programs. Members shared the success and challenges they are encountering as they continue to try to expand their programs.

REPORTING

Christi Chadwick shares Afton's findings needs assessment results and recommendations gathered from focus groups, surveys, and 1:1 interviews across the 61 institutions to better understand their experiences with ECACE. Chadwick shares the major themes that emerged from the needs assessment: institutions appreciate the collaboration ECACE has created, they still need support on assorted topics from ICCB and IBHE, and state agencies have provided much support, though some institutions are experiences challenged with fully benefitting from ECACE. Institutions have been able to make meaningful changes but have experienced implementation challenges. Institutions are requesting a variety of technical assistance support from ICCB and IBHE on topics such as but not limited to reporting, funding and grant information, and scholarships.

Jamila Jor'dan shares information on the Consortium reporting as required by legislation. Marcus Brown shares the parameters of the report including enrollment, retention, and persistence. The first report will detail the work from July 2021 – December 2022 including outreach events and participation, outreach, and technical assistance: navigators, academic and holistic supports, and programmatic changes in access and modality.

Nathan Wilson provides an update on data connectivity as it relates to data reporting and status sharing that data back to stakeholders. Through all the agency's data collection systems, the report will provide ECE enrollment numbers for fall and spring semesters, retention rates, persistence in relevant: associate, baccalaureate, and credential programs, demographic information: race, ethnicity, and federal Pell Grant status disaggregation, completion numbers and rates, employer type, and years worked. Wilson shares the data with advisory members.

Jamila Jor'dan facilitates a question-and-answer session with members of the advisory committee to provide feedback on the reporting.

1. As you hear the reporting framework, what are some of your initial reactions to the data that is being collected and reported? What sticks out to you?

Kate Conner expresses interest in the disaggregated data presented here regarding the state's workforce data. Are we serving the incumbent workforce in a mirrored way to those working in the field?

Ashley Harms applauds the work, bringing attention to the early childhood field by re-sparking student interest and engagement.

Emnet Ward is curious about those who are finishing school, is there data to show where they are being employed?

2. (In the Chat) What things did you hear that you think will be valuable to us continuing to report? Ashley Harms: all the information was useful and beneficial.

Laurie Elish-Piper: How do we plan to track graduate wages and retention in the field?

Avis Proctor: disaggregated enrollment, retention, persistence, and post-completion success data.

3. Are there other things that you would be curious to hear back about, even if they are not included in the formal report? Is there information that you feel is missing?

Emnet Ward: How many people are transferring from other professions into the early childhood field?

4. What other questions or thoughts do you have about reporting?

Jill Andrews, how are we tracking that early childhood centers are engaging in this work?

EXPANSION OF SCHOLARSHIP AND IMPLICATIONS

Marcus Brown shares information about the expansion of scholarships. Scholarships will now be open to freshman and sophomores at a 4-year institution, post-baccalaureate work, Professional Educator License (PEL), additional endorsements or letters of approval, master's degree for those seeking Early Childhood licensure, 2 courses for 'teacher qualified' in a licensed center AA student pursuing early childhood at a 2-year institution.

Christi Chadwick shares information on a recently released request for proposal (RFP) that was posted for four-year institutions to expand the pipelines to increase the number of diverse early childhood faculty in Illinois. The following four-year institutions were awarded grant funds: the University of Illinois Chicago, Illinois State University, National Lewis University, and Lewis University.
